

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Sixth International Sewa Meeting Held in New Delhi, India

The Sixth Sewa International Meeting -- a congregation of Sewa International chapters from around the world -- was held December 6-8, 2018, at the New Maharashtra Sadan, in New Delhi.

Sewa International representatives from 13 countries -- India, USA, United Kingdom, Australia, Myanmar, Nepal, Sri Lanka, United Arab Emirates, Oman, Saudi Arabia, Kuwait, Kenya, Trinidad and Tobago, and Nigeria -- participated in the three-day event. Eleven representatives from the United States' chapters attended the conference.

Day one, which was chaired by Dattatreya Hosabale, Joint General Secretary of the Rashtriya Swayamsevak Sangh, had seminars on the 17 *Sustainable Development Goals* (SDG), and what they mean to India and the social sector at large. The key note address was given by Dr. R. Balasubramaniam, a well-known development scholar, author, public policy advocate, leadership trainer and activist. This was followed by paper presentations by eight speakers covering the SDGs.

Sixth International Sewa Meeting Held in New Delhi, India

A documentary film screened on Sewa International's programs executed over the past two decades across India provided a holistic view of the work done, the diversity of the projects undertaken, and highlighting the impact on communities.

Day two saw the presentation of reports by Sewa representatives of the 13 countries, followed by interactive discussions and brainstorming sessions on the activities. Saumitra Gokhale, global coordinator for the Hindu Swayamsewak Sangh (HSS), summarized Sewa International's activities and work and how Sewa's work has been consistently expanding in terms of geographic reach and quality of work. The Chief Minister of Maharashtra, Devendra Fadnavis, graced the event and addressed the delegates.



On the final day, Kiren Rijiju, the Union Minister of State for Home Affairs, Government of India, addressed the participants on Disaster Mitigation and explained how it is a major concern of the government. Disaster Mitigation Measures are those that eliminate or reduce the impact and risk of hazards through proactive measures taken before an emergency or disaster occurs. He explained the challenges faced in implementing disaster mitigation measures and pointed out the critical role of the civil society and nonprofit organizations in facilitating this.

The discussion and brainstorming during the day ended with action points identified to take Sewa International activities to the next level:

- A five-year plan was recommended to be developed by all chapters, similar to the five-year strategic plan developed by Sewa International (USA)
- Disaster management to be a focus area -- organizations should invest in building a strong local network and invest in building a team to understand and strengthen disaster risk management; governance to manage disaster risks; Disaster Risk Reduction (DRR) for resilience; enhancing disaster preparedness for effective response; and to 'Build Back Better' (BBB) in recovery, rehabilitation, and reconstruction
- Reporting and documentation to be strengthened -- using technology tools, and involving young volunteers to strengthen the social media base
- Focusing on steps to be taken to adhere to the General Accounting Principles (GAP) by Sewa International chapters in all countries
- The need to involve more youth in all areas so as to train and prepare the next generation of leaders and organizers to serve communities
- Strategize on branding, social media, and advertising for a larger strategic reach
- Participate in Tedx talks and paper presentations at conferences for brand building and recognition
- Capacity building in each chapter by organizing webinars and exchange programs to help and energize all Sewa chapters

Sewa spreads Holiday Cheer for a people devastated by the California Camp Fire



Sewa International team, working with a group of local volunteers headed by Heather Helwig, a long-time resident of Loomis, Placer County, CA, organized Christmas luncheon 200 fire evacuees of the devastating fires that ravaged Northern California in early November 2018. The fire that originated in Butte County, CA, devastated the three cities of Paradise, Magalia, and Concow killing 83 people, burning down 6,500 homes, and driving about 52,000 people to seek shelter.

The luncheon was held at the Blue Goose Event Center in Loomis, Sunday, December 23. Over \$7,500 in gifts, gift certificates, and laptop computer donations were distributed to the attendees at the event. This brought some holiday cheer to the people who lost everything in the deadly fire.

The attendees were offered a delectable menu of traditional Christmas food, holiday pies, cookies, and more. A variety of activities were organized for all age groups: face painting, fashioning balloon animals, and a raffles game. There was a Christmas craft corner, and photos with Mr. and Mrs. Santa for the young and old alike. The attendees had an opportunity to participate in a raffles game and win several gift-hampers prepared by Sewa volunteers and the local volunteer team.

Melissa Johnson, a recipient, was very appreciative of the laptop computer donation and said "Thank you, Sewa. This is going to help me in my nursing career and going back to school." Another mother at the event, who escaped the fire, said, "Thanks Sewa for making Christmas doable for my kids. Paradise will stay strong because of you guys."

In the coming weeks, the Sewa International team will focus on rehabilitation work in collaboration with the local population. "Sewa means selfless service, and we are here to serve in any way possible," said Jyothsna Prasad, Sewa volunteer and the chief organizer of the event. "The enormity of the fires and the tragic consequences are still fresh in our minds, and any cheer and support we can offer we consider it a privilege and an honor," she said.

"An opportunity to serve the victims of this destructive natural event was the best holiday gift we received from this successful event," said Minal Joshi, a full-time Family Services Coordinator for Sewa International.

Contributing to Sewa International's outreach effort were three other NGOs -- Annapoorna of Sacramento, CA, Bharati Tamil Sangam, California and the VHP of America (VHPA) -- whose generosity helped Sewa International reach out to the distressed Loomis community.
