Get Inspired Atlanta 2010

Pioneered by Sewa Houston Chapter in 2009, this Summer Internship program for High School Students focused on assisting Bhutanese refugees settle into productive lives in the US. Seven interns put in an average of 25 hours per week during the three-month program focusing on children's activities, refugee extended learning, women empowerment, healthcare, public relations and fundraising.



Vision Care

Twenty-two Bhutanese refugees were diagnosed and prescribed glasses at the eye camp held on March 6th, 2010 by Dr. Indira Menon. This was a boon to many who do not have either Medicare or Medicaid. Further tests were prescribed to those identified with Glaucoma and other complications.



Bhutanese Refugee Empowerment Projects

National Bhutanese Refugee Empowerment Conference

Sewa International conducted the First National Bhutanese Refugee Empowerment Conference in Atlanta, GA, during April 17th - 18th, 2010. Over sixty Bhutanese delegates and one hundred attendees came from all across USA to make this pioneering conference memorable.

Counseling, Yoga & Meditation

Sewa International volunteers organized counseling sessions across various chapters to help Bhutanese refugees cope with new living conditions. Classes on Yoga, meditation and healthy lifestyle practices were conducted. Under a joint project with the Art of Living Foundation, the refugees learned Sudarshana Kriya meditation to help manage stress. The workshops were conducted in Atlanta, Georgia; Cleveland, Ohio; and Chicago, Illinois.



Ekam - Oneness, TN, India

A community Pediatric project of a collaborative network of voluntary Pediatricians, hospitals, nutritionists, voluntary organizations working towards social causes, Ekam-Oneness was started with a vision of "Right to health for every child". Sewa International is supporting this initiative in providing medical coverage to 42 orphanages in Chennai, Tamilnadu, India.

Livelihood Project in Delhi, India

Kalandhar Colony, with a population of more than 40,000 is one of the biggest slums in New Delhi, India. People work as contract laborers or do other small time jobs for their livelihood. Sewa International sponsored 10 cycle rickshaws and a maintenance unit thus supporting 11 families. Beneficiaries repay the cost over a 24 month period which would be used to support future beneficiaries thus making it a sustainable livelihood project.



Diwali Food Drive

Sewa International Chapters across the US teamed up with food banks to support local communities towards ending world hunger and to give something back to the community. Between Oct 30th and Nov 20th, chapters in Washington D.C., Maryland, Virginia, San Francisco Bay Area and Chicago set up numerous collection centers in their respective areas for people to donate non-perishable food items. Twelve Bay Area locations alone collected 1.74 tons of food.



Yuva for Seva Internship

Seven interns volunteered for 3 months on various projects in the states of Karnataka and Maharashtra in India. Significant among them were the setting up of 'Doctors for Seva' - an initiative of partner organization Youth for Seva in Bangalore. This is a group of voluntary medical doctors and hospitals who conduct free medical camps and follow-up referrals to the marginalized sections of the society.

Bihar Flood Relief

With three successive years of floods, the state of Bihar in India has been one of the worst flood affected areas. Sewa International through partner organization Seva Bharati has been involved in rescue, relief and rehabilitation work by setting up medical camps; providing dry food packets and clothing; rebuilding clinics; and a children's hostel.



Haiti Earthquake Rehabilitation

The disastrous earthquake of 7.0 magnitude in Haiti affected nearly 3 million people and left tens of thousands dead. In a country where over 80% are below the poverty line, and 54% in abject poverty, more than two thirds of the labor has no formal jobs.

Sewa with partner NGO CHAI-Haiti, the largest Haitian-American charity in the Midwest, sent volunteer physicians to Haiti and provided funds for medical rehabilitation.



Relief work in Leh (J & K, India)

Cloudburst resulting in flash floods hit Leh, the largest town in Ladakh region of Jammu & Kashmir, India on Aug 6, 2010 killing more than 200 people and over 500 missing. In an area where temperatures falls below freezing point, Sewa International partnered with a local NGO in providing immediate relief such as medical aid, food, utensils, blankets, footwear and shelter to affected victims.. Volunteers also engaged in clearing the debris and rescuing of trapped victims.
